

The biggest draw of Eunpyeong Hanok Village is the 11 village businesses that operate hanok experience programs.


These programs allow guests to spend a night or more in a hanok, for a true experience of the hanok culture that goes beyond sightseeing.




(1) Hongyougain, (2) Hanultari, (3) Cheonghyangjae, (4) Jahamheon, (5) ILWY Dalboro,







The Eunpyeong History Hanok Museum opened on October 7, 2014 to promote the history of Eunpyeong and the hanok culture. The museum preserves relics, presents exhibits, and offers activities related to the traditional hanoks that have been the homes of Eunpyeong residents for many years. Many of the artifacts housed at the museum were discovered during the development of Eunpyeong Newtown, beginning in 2005.

Jingwansa Temple

Jingwansa is a famous Buddhist temple in Seoul, one of city's four landmark Buddhist temples. The temple has a long history that dates back to King Hyeonjong, the 8th king of Goryeo, who once repelled a Khitan invasion and protected national sovereignty. King Hyeonjong established the temple in the year 1011 at Jingwandaesa. The temple was destroyed when it was bombed during the Korean War but has since been restored. Jingwansa operates a one-day, resting-type temple stay program for temple visitors. Come stay at Jingwansa Temple and spend time with the monks as you enjoy the beautiful natural scenery, escape your hectic life, and experience true healing for your soul.
